








Annual Gender Sensitisation Plan

The Institute of Home Economics has a zero-tolerance policy towards sexual harassment and is proactively committed to providing a safe and conducive academic environment to its students and employees. We are committed to follow Sexual Harassment of Women at Workplace (prevention, prohibition and redressal) Act, 2013.

Display of information: To enhance the student's understanding of the issue, the college displays materials on Sexual Harassment at the work place and creates and sustains dialogue and discourse around it. Young girls and women are informed about forms of abuse that may not be explicit and easily recognised, such as emotional and mental abuse.

The college website includes statutory provisions related to prevention and prohibition of sexual harassment at workplace.

The following documents are accessible on college website and in college library. The students are oriented at the time of admission, in interactions with faculty and advisors and by distributing infographics, handouts.

- (i) The Sexual Harassment of Women at Workplace (prevention, prohibition and redressal) Act, 2013
- (ii) Handbook On Sexual Harassment of Women at Workplace
- (iii) UGC Regulations on Sexual Harassment 2015

Constitution of ICC and its objectives: In accordance with Sexual Harassment of Women at Workplace (Prevention, Prohibition and Redressal) Act, 2013 as well as UGC Regulations, 2015 pertaining to higher educational institutions, the college has a duly constituted, Internal Complaints Committee (ICC). In addition to fulfilling the responsibilities of the ICC as laid down in the UGC regulations, the committee has the following broad objectives:

- 1. To sensitise students to various gender related issues.
- 2. To spread awareness about sexual harassment at work place as well as the functioning of the ICC.
- 3. To deal with the complaints relating to sexual harassment at work place from students or employees.

The list of ICC members along with their e-mails and phone numbers is also displayed on the website.

Dealing with a complaint: Any student or staff aggrieved in this matter either approach the Presiding Officer of the ICC or the members to file a complaint against sexual harassment. Sometimes the students seek advice with the faculty members or write emails/ letters to the principal. In such cases also the students are assured of their safety and privacy and complaint is processed through ICC after getting consent from the complainant.

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Complaint to ICC

One complaint of sexual harassment was received in year 2017 where a student (X) complained against a male faculty(Y) of the college. She stated that the teacher sends messages and videos to her late night which are not related to studies. The teacher also takes excess time to correct her assignments and insists on giving face to face feedback. She felt uncomfortable because of the personal comments made by the teacher on her looks. The student was also fearful as the teacher shared that she will lose marks in internal assessment if she doesn't listen to this teacher.

The ICC members immediately instructed to shift the student from the teachers' guidance till suitable investigation is done in this matter. The matter was resolved after holding 5 to 6 meetings of ICC members with both complainant and accused. Suitable action was taken against the concerned faculty and the complaint was resolved to the satisfaction of complainant.




