15. Multidisciplinary / interdisciplinary

The Institute is affiliated to University of Delhi and has implemented NEP for the undergraduate programmes in accordance with University norms from the year 2022. A committee for drafting of NEP courses has been continuously working to revise curriculum in line with the NEP objectives. The committee endeavors to integrate various cross-cutting issues relevant to human values, professional ethics and environment issues along with other thrust areas outlined in NEP in the curriculum. The committee also works towards promotion of internships, training and placements for students by building and strengthening partnerships with peer institutes, civil society organizations and industry. The institute is a multidisciplinary college and collaborates with other departments from time to time for projects that offer varied learning opportunities to students. The Department of Fabric and Apparel Science collaborates with the Microbiology department for projects of microbial dyes, pigments, screening of enzymes, etc. Food and Nutrition department collaborates with the Microbiology, Biochemistry and Human Development department for research and outreach projects. The UG students study General Electives (GEs) papers, Value added Courses (VAC) and Skill Enhancement Courses (SEC) which are other than their domain and enhance their engagement in multidisciplinary academic activities and equip them with a wider learning canvas.

16.Academic bank of credits (ABC):

The first year students were apprised about the Academic Bank of credits during orientation. They were briefed about how Academic Bank of Credits (ABC) diverges from the traditional degree conferring mechanism by providing academic flexibility and autonomy. Students are also encouraged and motivated to take up online courses to enhance their self-learning ability and gain knowledge on latest technological developments in their domains. Furthermore, IHE is devising ways to implement ABC and aid students with the appropriate mechanism of credit transfer process to earn a degree/diploma/certificate. The committee formed for NEP implementation also plans to strengthen the IT infrastructure and recruit a skilled workforce to manage the bank of credits.

17.Skill development:

IHE offers an interdisciplinary nature of programs that expose the students to varied skill sets. These may be part of the existing programs and courses or their skill development may take place by exposure to participatory methodologies such as workshops, webinars, panel discussions, demonstrations, short term courses to instill skill- based learning. The skilling initiatives taken by the college envisage to make the entry of college students into jobs seamless and effortless. NEP provides them the opportunity to choose Skill Enhancement Courses (SECs) from a wide variety of programs like healthy and sustainable food choices, early childhood care and education settings, visual communication etc. The NEP drafting committee has been constituted for UGCF structuring and it worked in close consultation with university guidelines. It deliberated upon the need to start programs on selection and module preparations for different skill sets- life, vocational and/or digital empowerment. Value Added Courses (VAC) were also initiated by the NEP Drafting committee like financial literacy, science and society, ethics and culture etc. VACs are based on skill value based education and the Task Force plans to initiate collaborative activities with other higher educational, cultural and civil establishments. The NEP drafting committee of departments got core, elective, GE, VAC and SEC papers passed through the Committee of Courses (COC). College facilitated the implementation of National Education Policy 2020 by orienting both students and the faculty members for better understanding of the structure. A Centennial Oration and a Panel Discussion was held on National Education Policy, 2020 on 18th October 2022. Prof Ajay Ghatok, Prof Chandra Bhushan Sharma, Prof K. Ratnabali , Prof. Haneet Gandhi and Dr. Punita Duhan were the eminent speakers who graced the occasion.

18.Appropriate integration of Indian Knowledge system (teaching in Indian Language, culture, using online course)

The NEP drafting committee had drafted guidelines for the promotion of Indian Knowledge System with the aim to acquaint our college students with diverse socio-cultural context. To identify the creative talents of students, various cultural events have been conducted that are in Indian languages. To embrace the Indian culture and tradition, various events such as classical music/ singing competitions, classical dance, rangoli, face painting, clay modeling etc. have also been conducted. For better understanding, in classroom teaching, faculties also explain the concepts in local language. At our institute, we have been conducting classes in AEC Hindi and students are sent to various cluster colleges for other local languages. Moreover, there have been VAC and SEC which are attuned to the Indian knowledge systems, for example a course in Ayurveda and Nutrition which helps the students to understand the ancient Indian system of medicine that has been practiced for thousands of years. The students have thus gained a deeper understanding of using food as medicine to promote health and wellness.

19. Focus on Outcome based education (OBE): Focus on Outcome based education (OBE):

The courses offered by IHE are all outcome driven. Various department meetings were held to upgrade the syllabus implementation of semester 1 and 2 according to outcome based learning objectives. The committees brainstormed for upcoming semester 3 and It is mandated for the faculty members of our institution that the design of curriculum of all the courses need to promote creativity, critical thinking, encourage logical decision making, boost innovation and a culture of research which would equip the students with a wider perspective to deal with real life issues. The enrolled students are marked and evaluated for their regular performance in classroom settings on the assigned assignments in stipulated time period. The pedagogy followed is outcome driven which involves problem analysis and solving, ethical concerns, environment and sustainability, individual and team work, communication skills, content writing and critical analysis, project management skills, etc. The institute offers high academic content along with vocational opportunities.

20.Distance education/online education:

NEP encourages the students to undertake courses both in the online and the hybrid mode. IHE thus intends to strengthen the online teaching modes and digital communication. The institute offers

various papers that equip its students with updated and in demand skills like digital empowerment, digital marketing, digital communication. This initiative requires upgrading audio and video recording facilities as well as editing platforms. IHE is well equipped in this respect with a state of art audio studio consisting of two sound proof rooms, audio mixer, mics, etc. It has provided the requirement of a video studio to be sanctioned by the University of Delhi under the project DUDISCAD (DU Digital Infrastructure Support for Colleges and Departments). As these facilities get upgraded, highly motivated and well trained faculty would develop MOOCs for blending learning mechanisms. It would enable IHE to reach out to the larger student community on the web not only from regional geographical locations but from other far off universities as well bringing revolution in education delivery. IHE is also assigned as the Learner Support Centre for conducting contact programmes for Indira Gandhi National Open University (IGNOU). The Centre conducts theory/practical sessions for the nutrition and child development courses in online and offline mode

2.2 - Catering to Student Diversity

2.2.1 - The institution assesses the learning levels of the students and organizes special Programmes for advanced learners and slow learners

The institute believes in inclusive practices hence teaching, evaluation and co-curriculum activities are designed to make all the learners, including students with special needs, to feel a part of the larger group. Moreover, the assignments and classes address the academic needs of all achievement levels. For example, departments hold tutorial classes which aim to address the academic problems faced by students, in smaller groups. This enables the teachers to focus in a better way on the different ability and needs groups. Also, the doubts of the students were cleared individually whenever required by them even beyond the routine classes.

To provide real world insight, talks were organised by the experts from the industries and academia. The hands-on experience was provided to students in their respective fields through internships, field work, training sessions, workshops and project work. The students were motivated to take part in intercollege contests, quizzes, and discussions to hone their presentational, analytical, and problem-solving skills. Educational visits were arranged to various academic institutes and industries to inspire students and provide them the platform for interactions with the academicians/scientists/ industries experts, and to get the first-hand experiences about the advanced technologies and the opportunities available in different fields. Alumni were invited online/ offline for career counselling and for encouraging students through their success stories.

2.3 - Teaching- Learning Process

2.3.1 - Student centric methods, such as experiential learning, participative learning and problem solving methodologies are used for enhancing learning experiences

Our college uses student-centred teaching strategies with emphasis on problem-solving techniques and participatory learning.

- Since 2017, the DBT STAR college scheme has given students opportunities for sustained growth through workshops, and project work. Various departments such as FNFT, FAS, Biochemistry, and Microbiology have greatly benefited.
- The FNFT Department actively participates in community-based initiatives to educate, and create awareness among the weaker segments of society about nutrition and health. Students participate in the events and work of different societies like the Association of Food Scientists and Technologists, the Indian Dietetics Association, and the Nutrition Society of India.
- The B.El.Ed curriculum covers physical education, school internships, block teaching, fine arts, craft, participatory work, and projects that give students real-world experience.
 - The HDCS department has established AARAMBH, an Early Childhood Learning Centre for children in age group of 2-4 years, also provides daycare facilities for children aged between 2 to 8 years.
- The DCEJ department provides training to students for literacy,

digital literacy, and skill development as part of community outreach programs.

• The RMDA department provide skills to the students in microenterprise management and self-employment under entrepreneurial management skills. The Department has a design lab too where it conducts meaningful and imaginative experiments.

- In order to enhance the quality of teaching and learning process, IHE promotes extensive use of ICT-enabled tools, including online resources. In accordance with the instructions received from the University for lockdown period, the faculty conducted online classes via Google Meet integrated in Google Classroom during the time of pandemic.
- The SOL digital library, SOL e-pustakdwar, HRD Ministry Programs such as SWAYAM, e-PGPathshala, National Digital Library, Virtual Labs, DULS e-resources, online services, e-Gyankosh, INFLIBNET, NPTEL, Slide share, YouTube, e-books and e-journals, Online videos, Podcast AUTO CAD and 3ds -MAX software are among the most frequently exploited e-resources by students and faculty.
- The URKUND plagiarism tool is available at the college library.
- The college can organize talks, seminars, and workshops in ICT equipped classrooms for regular classes. Projectors, laptops, computers, printers, book visualisers, LCD projectors, speakers, sound amplification audio studios with facilities for audio recording and editing.
- TVs and DVD playersare among the ICT tools and resources available. The college has three functional computer labs with 123 computers connected to internet and loaded with the latest software. Numerous open-access databases, such as NCBI Gene Runner and Primer 3, are also available.

There is an IA committee at the Institute which has representatives from every department. The college has digitalized its assessment procedures and online entry of attendance by implementing the College ERP system, Imagination Learning System (ILS).

- 1. As teachers enter attendance and assessment data, on monthly basis also at the end of semester the students can view month wise IA marks and attendance on the ILS college portal.
- 2. ILS generates various reports including IA Report, Student Marks Report, Consolidated Attendance Report, and the Percentage Attendance Report, which are then uploaded on the website.
- 3. TICs of every department submits necessary corrections to members

of IA committee via a Google claim sheet at the end of the semester.

- 4. After the modifications the internal assessment is finally uploaded on the University portal.
- 5. In each semester, online upkeep of the course and paper information along with their mapping with appropriate faculty and departments is carried out.

- 4.1.1 The Institution has adequate infrastructure and physical facilities for teaching- learning. viz., classrooms, laboratories, computing equipment etc.
 - 1. The College encompasses an aesthetic building & a well maintained lush green campus spread over 2.07 acres (8376.993 m2) of land in the heart of urban Delhi ensuring adequate availability and optimal utilization of physical infrastructure for delivering high-quality education and promoting the holistic development of students. It is equipped with modern facilities and learning resources.
 - 2. The college encompasses two teaching blocks and has spacious classrooms, laboratories, and faculty rooms. There is provision in classrooms and laboratories to use LCD projectors that augment the quality of teaching-learning processes.
 - 3. The college has three computer laboratories. Each lab is equipped withcomputer workstations, internet access, and projectors. The college has access to software programs like AutoCAD and 3Ds Max, Nuendo audio editing software, Corel, SPSS etc. The computer lab also provides access to E-resources like JSTOR, DULS e-resources, and NList.
 - 4. The college upgraded its laboratory equipment under the DST-FIST grant and the DBT Star College Scheme. The college labs arewell-equipped with equipment like autoclaves, BOD incubators, Shaker incubators, Laminar flow, Microscopes, Spectrophotometers, Electrophoresis devices, and Centrifuges.
 - 5. The college also has a central laboratoryfacility having equipment like HPLC, a deep freezer, a Spectrophotometer, and a refrigerated Centrifuge for research.
 - 6. For the production of electronic media and its learning processes, the college has an Audio Studio which is soundproof and includes audio production equipment.

Appraisal for the Teaching Staff:

• Evaluation of the teaching staff is primarily based on the

- Annual Performance Appraisal Report (APAR) and the Performance Based Appraisal Scheme (PBAS) proforma, used for seeking appraisal or promotions by the faculty.
- Teachers are required to complete the APAR form annually which should reflect their contributions to teaching and other college responsibilities.
- An appraisal/selection committee, appointed by the director in coordination with the IQAC screens and examine the proforma adhering to UGC-CAS guidelines for promotions.
- Faculty members eligible for promotions are required to appear before the screening-cum-selection committee.

Appraisal for the Non-Teaching Staff:

- All non-teaching staff members are evaluated through an annual confidential report and annual performance appraisal process.
- Each employee fills and submits the APAR, which assesses various parameters outlined in the form. The assessment is conducted by the teacher-in-charge and then forwarded to the Director, focusing on the overall performance of the employee and assigning scores accordingly.

For normal everyday waste, all floors of both buildings are equipped with dustbins for degradable and bio-degradable waste.
- 2. Biomedical waste is always pretreated/autoclaved and sent to an authorised agency "Biotic waste solutions".
- 3. Swachhata Abhiyaan and Swatcchta pakhwara was organized by the NSS teamon 19th September 2022 with a large number of volunteers participating in different activities.
- 4. Several collection drives and rallieswere conducted. E-Waste Collection Drive and Plastic waste Drive was organized from 18th 21st April 2023 in collaboration with 'Attero Recycling Pvt Ltd' and IPCA, wherein students and staff gave away their e-waste, which was further handed over to Attero Recycling Pvt. Ltd. and the plastic waste was handed over to IPAC for disposal in a sustainable manner to reduce the plastic waste load on landfills.
- 5. An interactive session on E-Waste Management on 21st April 2023 by Mr. Shiv Chander Jha, Associate Manager Operations, Attero Recycling Pvt Ltd'. to generate awareness on sustainable e-waste management, and the 3R'sof e-waste.
