11. Significant contributions made by IQAC during the current year (maximum five bullets)

Key contributions of the IQAC include: 1. The IQAC has played a key role in organizing numerous hands-on capacity-building workshops, training programs, seminars, and faculty development initiatives for both teaching and non-teaching staff, as well as students. Some of these events were organized in collaboration with other institutions such as Ramanujan College. 2. Research and Development Cell was established at the Institute following the recommendation of the IQAC. This initiative provides PhD research scholars and faculty with a platform to share their work. The committee also works to streamline the process of conducting research projects and consultancies, thereby fostering a culture of research within the institute. 3. The IQAC has worked to strengthen the alumni network by creating a "Wall of Eminence" in the college and hosting an Alumni Meet in February 2024. Additionally, a WhatsApp community was created to enhance connections with alumni. 4. To promote the use of Hindi in office operations and encourage its use among students, the IQAC organized "Hindi Pakhwada" from September 11-14, 2023. Various competitions were held for students and faculty, along with a talk titled "Hindi: Kal, Aaj aur Kal." Following this, a Rajbhasha Committee was formed upon the recommendation of the IQAC. 5. The IQAC has also streamlined the process of gathering feedback from students and stakeholders, analyzing their recommendations to guide

ongoing efforts for quality enhancement.

15. Multidisciplinary / interdisciplinary

National Education Policy (NEP) being an inclusive, holistitic and flexible education system envisions the development of the creative potential of students. Its interdisciplinary approach is an innovative approach related to teaching and learning and for curriculum integration making the students' educational experiences more relatable to life in general and of greater value to students when the curricula reflect real life, which is multi-faceted rather than being compartmentalized into single disciplines. Our college has been successfully able to implement NEP as our niche courses inherently have a strong thrust on inter- and multi-disciplinary education. For curriculum development, the college has served as one of the nodal centers for updating Department of Home Science courses for UGCF 2022. All faculty members have participated in restructuring the curriculum in different disciplines to align the courses with the policy's multidisciplinary focus. The institution offers credit-based courses that are flexible and innovative with a special focus given to environmental education and value-based courses. By offering interdisciplinary value-added courses, skill

enhancement courses, and other courses, different departments come together to provide a rich experience to students. With this, General Electives (GEs) papers are offered to enhance students' engagement in multidisciplinary academic activities and equip them with a wider learning canvas. The institution follows the multiple entry-exit systems as stipulated by the university. To ensure multidisciplinarity, each semester offers courses that promote heterogeneity and interdisciplinary methodology. Various departments also collaborate on guiding PhD and MSc research studies to provide students with exposure to expertise from multiple disciplines. Ongoing research includes the development of fermented natural black dye, exploring teachers' understanding and differentiated practices for gifted learners, and screening and extracting microbial pigments for textile dyeing.

16.Academic bank of credits (ABC):

Academic Bank of Credits (ABC) is a unique and novel mechanism in higher academic institutions. It diverges from the traditional degree conferring mechanism by providing academic flexibility and autonomy. As a college of the University of Delhi, students are registered under ABC and are availing the benefits that the university offers. By keeping the focus of internationalization in mind, faculties have been involved in the designing of new curricula. Innovative pedagogical approaches have also been incorporated by the faculty to create interest among students. By allowing movement across various higher educational institutions, students are availing of the facility provided by ABC. Our college has been playing an important role in facilitating these movements. The institution informs students about the ABC system during orientation of newly admitted students and it is reinforced through advisory groups also.

17.Skill development:

Skill- enhancement has always been a strong forte of our college. With the Skill enhancement courses, our institute has been strengthening the vocational education and soft skills of students by offering from the pool of Skill Enhancement courses (SEC) stipulated by the University. While the DSC (Discipline Specific Core) and DSE (Discipline Specific Electives) Courses already have a skill development component woven into them as part of mainstream education, specific attention is paid to the delicate interweaving of SECs. The SECs provided by our institute have a special focus on high-quality vocational and digital skills to ensure access to work for young adults. Some of the SECs that we have offered are: CAD for Fashion, Digital Marketing, Social Media Marketing, Mushroom Culture

and Technology, Plant Aromatics and Perfumery, Developing Sustainability Plans for a Business, Basic Laboratory Techniques, Image Styling, Apiculture, Digital Empowerment, Financial Literacy, Environmental Auditing and so on. The inherent multidisciplinary nature of our college has been such that we have been able to provide a range of SECs and their popularity and pertinence have been recognized by other colleges. We have been offering this to students of other colleges also, who through the credit transfer facility have been able to participate. Various departments and committee have organised various specialized workshops on storytelling, emotional intelligence, design, and mindfulness.

18.Appropriate integration of Indian Knowledge system (teaching in Indian Language, culture, using online course)

Indian knowledge, culture, and languages have always been important in the ethos of our institute. Indian languages have been part of communication - formal and informal, while being an important component of pedagogy. Recently, these attempts have been augmented for the benefit of students. Pedagogic approaches cater to the differential needs of students by incorporating Indian languages. The AEC (Ability enhancement courses) that are mandatory for all the students are oriented around Indian languages and are taught innovatively. Hindi has been promoted at the levels of curricula, pedagogy, and official communication. With Hindi, the other Indian languages that we have promoted are Punjabi, Tamil, Malayalam, Urdu, and Bengali. Our students have been part of cultural programs of other colleges to get this exposure building on the collaborative The Indian knowledge systems are specifically taken care of through the introduction of new courses to preserve and disseminate our knowledge and celebrate the rich cultural heritage of our country. Some of these mandatory value-added courses have been Vedic Mathematics, Ayurveda and Nutrition, Ethics and Values in Ancient Indian Tradition, Ethics and Culture, Yoga: Philosophy and Practice.

19. Focus on Outcome based education (OBE): Focus on Outcome based education (OBE):

By actively participating in the curriculum renewal and development, our institute has actively adopted its curriculum to outcome-based education. Consequently, the courses offered by IHE are all outcomedriven. Students are regularly informed about the program and course outcomes, which are also available on the website for easy access. The enrolled students are marked and evaluated for their regular performance in classroom settings on the allocated assignments in the stipulated period. The pedagogy followed is outcome-driven and focuses on the methodology that enhances student's capacity to

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deliver in assignments, tests, etc. The outcome-based education in practice involves problem analysis and solving, ethical concerns, environment and sustainability, individual and teamwork, communication skills, content writing and critical analysis, project management skills, etc.

20.Distance education/online education:

Our institute has strengthened the online teaching modes and digital communication. IHE is well equipped in this respect with a wellfunctional Audio studio consisting of two sound proof rooms, an audio mixer, microphones, etc. teaching modes, and digital communication. By offering papers like CAD for Fashion, Digital Marketing, Social Media Marketing, Digital Empowerment, Financial Literacy, and Environmental Auditing, our institute is equipping students with updated and in-demand skills. Under the Vidya Vistar Scheme, IHE has signed a MOU with the Government Zirtiri Science Residential College, Aizawl, Mizoram. This collaboration encourages online distance learning and empowers students of both colleges by offering diverse programs and experiences. The constant webinars on different topics of contemporary concerns are done either in online or hybrid mode nourishing the distance education ethos of the policy. Our faculty have attended various programs and been a speaker also facilitating this spirit. IHE is also designated as the Learner Support Centre for conducting contact programs on behalf of Indira Gandhi National Open University (IGNOU). The Centre offers both theory and practical sessions for nutrition and child development related courses in both online and offline formats, as well as evaluating assignments and providing guidance for projects and dissertations.

2.2 - Catering to Student Diversity

- 2.2.1 The institution assesses the learning levels of the students and organizes special Programmes for advanced learners and slow learners
 - The Institute is committed to fostering an inclusive learning environment where teaching, evaluation, and cocurricular activities cater to the diverse needs of all students, including students with special needs. Lessons and assignments are carefully designed to accommodate the students' varying learning abilities, ensuring an equitable support environment for each student. Faculty members assess students' learning levels through interaction and evaluations, identifying their strengths and areas needing improvement to adapt teaching strategies accordingly. Orientation programs are conducted to familiarize students with course outcomes, curricula, assessment methods, and available college facilities.
 - To address students' academic challenges, various departments conduct tutorial sessions in smaller groups and remedial classes to help slow learners. The institute's Equal Opportunity cell guides faculty members in developing inclusive approaches for students with special needs. In Faculty's time table, a two-hour contact period is dedicated to address students' doubts and challenges.
 - The institute organizes expert talks by industry professionals and academicians, offering students valuable insights into their fields. Practical exposure is further enriched through internships, fieldwork, workshops, training sessions, and project work. Advanced learners are also encouraged to participate in intercollegiate competitions, quizzes, and discussions to enhance their analytical, problem-solving, and presentation skills. Students have been given opportunity to participate in project work and in paper and chapter writing.

2.3 - Teaching- Learning Process

2.3.1 - Student centric methods, such as experiential learning, participative learning and problem solving methodologies are used for enhancing learning experiences

- Microbiology and Biochemistry departments organize regular workshops, conferences, and seminars for the students.
- The Food & Nutrition and Food Technology Department actively participates in community-based initiatives to educate and raise awareness about nutrition and health among the weaker segments of society. Students participate in the activities and work of various societies, such as the Nutrition Society of India, the Indian Dietetics Association, and the Association of Food Scientists and Technologists.
- The B.El.Ed curriculum includes physical education, school internships, block teaching, fine arts, crafts, participatory work, and projects that give students realworld experience.
- In addition to offering childcare services for children between 2 to 8 years, the Human Development and Childhood Studies Department established AARAMBH, an Early Childhood Learning Center for children aged 2-4 years.
- As part of community outreach initiatives, the Department of Development Communication Extension and Journalism trains

students in literacy, digital literacy, and skill development. The department also develops bi-lingual reading materials and practical manuals to help students in the learning process.

- The Resource Management and Design Application department actively engages students in hands-on activities, applying their knowledge to practical situations. Workshops like 'Making Recycled Paper Products' and 'Illustrating Forest Landscapes' allow students to connect theory with practice, fostering creativity and problem-solving skills.
- The Fabric and Apparel Sciences department organizes expert workshops, and visits to research organizations to train the students in dyeing, printing, marketing, and merchandising.

- To enhance the quality of teaching and learning, IHE actively promotes the use of ICT-enabled tools and online resources both for faculty and students.
- Many classrooms are equipped with projection facilities, enabling faculty to deliver engaging lectures through interactive presentations. These presentations, along with additional e-resources, video links, and e-lectures, are uploaded to Google Classroom, allowing students to study at their own pace and gain a deeper understanding of the material. Students and faculty frequently access a wide range of e-resources, including the SOL digital library, SOL e-pustakdwar, SWAYAM, e- PG Pathshala National Digital Library, Virtual Labs, DULS e-resources, e-Gyankosh, INFLIBNET, NPTEL, YouTube, e-books, e-journals, online videos, podcasts, and specialized software like AUTO-CAD and 3ds MAX.
- The college also provides access to the Urkund/Drillbit plagiarism detection tool through its library.

- ICT-equipped classrooms support talks, seminars, workshops, and regular teaching with resources like projectors, laptops, computers, and sound amplification systems.
 Facilities also include audio studios with recording and editing capabilities, as well as TVs and DVD players.
- The institution houses three computer labs with 155 internetconnected computers equipped with the latest software.
- Class-specific social media groups are used to facilitate discussions, share resources, and make announcements, serving as supplementary platforms for communication and engagement.

 - Spread across 2.07 acres (8376.993 m2) of land in the centre of urban Delhi, the college features an attractive red-brick building and a well-kept, lush green campus. This ensures that there is enough physical infrastructure available which is used optimally to provide high-quality education and support students' holistic development. In line with its vision and strategic goals, it is furnished with state-of-the-art facilities and educational materials to attain academic success.
 - The college has two teaching blocks. Each block has large classrooms, laboratories, department and faculty rooms. LCD projectors are available in classrooms and laboratories, which improves the quality of teaching and learning. The college has three computer labs. Each lab is outfitted with computer workstations, internet connection, and projectors to facilitate practical teaching. The college has access to tools such as AutoCAD, Nuendo music editing software, Corel, and SPSS. The computer lab also gives access to electronic resources such as JSTOR, DULS e-resources, and N-List etc.
 - The college is equipped with departmental and central lab facilities including autoclaves, BOD incubators, shaker incubators, laminar flow systems, microscopes, spectrophotometers, electrophoresis instruments, lyophilisers and centrifuges etc. The institution is also equipped with a sound-proof Audio Studio with audio production equipment for producing electronic media and learning procedures.

- The college provides dedicated internet connectivity with a bandwidth of 250 Mbps for the benefit of students and college personnel, allowing them to use internet for official work.
- Wi-Fi is installed in classrooms, laboratories, and offices to give internet access. Wherever high-speed connectivity is

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- required, departments are provided with a wired connection via optical cable. In addition, the College has a 100 Mbps backup internet connection from ACT Fibernet.
- A specialised computer lab with 88 desktop computers is available for browsing and accessing e-resources, in addition to computer available in each department. The computer laboratory is staffed with highly technically qualified individuals.

 - 1. The institute uses systematic approaches to manage its physical, academic, and support facilities, which include laboratories, classrooms and other facilities.
 - 2. Dedicated staff council committees, such as the Library, Sports, Automation, Environment, Time table, Purchase, and Building Committees, meet on a regular basis to monitor specific areas of maintenance.
 - 3. Each facility employs dedicated personnel, such as caretakers, lab assistants, and computer in-charges, to ensure correct maintenance. The Government e-Marketplace (GeM) ensures that purchases correspond to government rules.
 - 4. The Student Amenities Committee is in charge of maintaining the canteen and communal areas.
 - 5. Classroom management follows approved systems and incorporates current teaching and learning environments. Regular cleaning, maintenance, and asset management, especially Annual Maintenance Contracts (AMCs), are essential. The college Caretaker manages these along with the other staff.
 - 6. Laboratories, which are administered by a designated teacherin-charge, lab assistant, and attendant, are subjected to regular maintenance and updates.
 - 7. The library, which is managed by a librarian and support personnel, focusses on the availability and usage of instructional materials.
 - 8. Sports facilities are overseen by the Sports Committee, which ensures correct equipment issue, maintenance suggestions, and record keeping.

- 9. IT facilities, which are maintained by laboratory technicians and a system administrator, receive external vendor support for major issues.

 - Vermicomposting is being carried out on a regular basis in the college for past few years.
 - Waste paper is recycled in the college recycling unit. As far as possible, used A4 papers are reused for rough work, assignments, notices, applications etc., empty cardboard cartons were reused as waste paper collection boxes.
 - The institute had signed a contract with an agency 'Biotic

- Waste Solutions Pvt. Ltd' to collect and dispose-off biomedical and bio-hazardous waste generated in college.
- The college also manages solid waste by giving it to the MCD.
- E-waste including discardable printers, phones and other electronic waste are regularly discarded and updated whenever possible.
- The college not only believes in recycling but also reducing the amount of waste being generated.
- All through the year, environmental awareness events in different forms like webinars, student marches, cleanliness drives etc. were organized to increase awareness among students.

 - To address students' academic challenges, various departments conduct tutorial sessions in smaller groups and remedial classes to help slow learners. The institute's Equal Opportunity cell guides faculty members in developing inclusive approaches for students with special needs. In Faculty's time table, a two-hour contact period is dedicated to address students' doubts and challenges.
 - The institute organizes expert talks by industry professionals and academicians, offering students valuable insights into their fields. - The Food & Nutrition and Food Technology Department actively participates in community-based initiatives to educate and raise awareness about nutrition and health among the weaker segments of society. Students participate in the activities and work of various societies, such as the Nutrition Society of India, the Indian Dietetics Association, and the Association of Food Scientists and Technologists.
- The B.El.Ed curriculum includes physical education, school internships, block teaching, fine arts, crafts, participatory work, and projects that give students realworld experience.
- In addition to offering childcare services for children between 2 to 8 years, the Human Development and Childhood Studies Department established AARAMBH, an Early Childhood Learning Center for children aged 2-4 years.

- As part of community outreach initiatives, the Department of Development Communication Extension and Journalism trains students in literacy, digital literacy, and skill development. The department also develops bi-lingual reading materials and practical manuals to help students in the learning process.
- The Resource Management and Design Application department actively engages students in hands-on activities, applying their knowledge to practical situations.

- 4.1.1 The Institution has adequate infrastructure and physical facilities for teaching-learning. viz., classrooms, laboratories, computing equipment etc.
 - Spread across 2.07 acres (8376.993 m2) of land in the centre of urban Delhi, the college features an attractive red-brick building and a well-kept, lush green campus. This ensures that there is enough physical infrastructure available which is used optimally to provide high-quality education and support students' holistic development. In line with its vision and strategic goals, it is furnished with state-of-the-art facilities and educational materials to attain academic success.
 - The college has two teaching blocks. Each block has large classrooms, laboratories, department and faculty rooms. LCD projectors are available in classrooms and laboratories, which improves the quality of teaching and learning. The college has three computer labs. Each lab is outfitted with computer workstations, internet connection, and projectors to facilitate practical teaching. The college has access to tools such as AutoCAD, Nuendo music editing software, Corel, and SPSS. The computer lab also gives access to electronic resources such as JSTOR, DULS e-resources, and N-List etc.

• The college is equipped with departmental and central lab facilities including autoclaves, BOD incubators, shaker incubators, laminar flow systems, microscopes, spectrophotometers, electrophoresis instruments, lyophilisers and centrifuges etc. The institution is also equipped with a sound-proof Audio Studio with audio production equipment for producing electronic media and learning procedures.

- The Institute of Home Economics features a well-stocked Central Library and departmental libraries that house a vast collection of about 26000 resource materials such as academic books, journals, theses, research projects, rare books, and other informative publications and reading materials.
- Students can further broaden their search by using the internet, e-books, e-journals, and other resources provided by the digital library. Students and teachers also have access to DULS. The Institute's library has a positive impact on the academic accomplishment of students.

- In 2018, the library was partially automated utilising the 'KOHA' program an open-source LMS that is fully comprehensive and adaptable. Cataloguing, customisable search, online circulation, and barcode printing are among the key KOHA features in use.
- The library uses the Dewey Decimal System for classification, and books are processed using AACR-II codes. The Call Number in the WEBOPAC assists in locating the books on the shelves. The library is open on all working days. After enrolling in the college, a student automatically becomes a member of the library.

- The entire Institute is Wi-Fi enabled with required firewalls, and computer labs are connected via LAN with internet access. The Institute also has an Internet registered domain name, www.ihe.du.ac.in, via which it provides its own e-mail service to staff and students.
- The college provides dedicated internet connectivity with a bandwidth of 250 Mbps for the benefit of students and college personnel, allowing them to use internet for official work.
- Wi-Fi is installed in classrooms, laboratories, and offices to give internet access. Wherever high-speed connectivity is required, departments are provided with a wired connection via optical cable. In addition, the College has a 100 Mbps backup internet connection from ACT Fibernet.
- A specialised computer lab with 88 desktop computers is available for browsing and accessing e-resources, in addition to computer available in each department. The computer laboratory is staffed with highly technically qualified individuals.

- 4. The Student Amenities Committee is in charge of maintaining the canteen and communal areas.
- 5. Classroom management follows approved systems and incorporates current teaching and learning environments. Regular cleaning, maintenance, and asset management, especially Annual Maintenance Contracts (AMCs), are essential. The college Caretaker mananges these along with the other staff.
- 6. Laboratories, which are administered by a designated teacher-in-charge, lab assistant, and attendant, are subjected to regular maintenance and updates.
- 7. The library, which is managed by a librarian and support personnel, focusses on the availability and usage of instructional materials.
- 8. Sports facilities are overseen by the Sports Committee, which ensures correct equipment issue, maintenance suggestions, and record keeping.

- Organic waste disposal at IHE is managed through aerobins. With the assistance of Sulabh cleaning workers, organic waste produced in the departments and college canteen is separated via different bins, gathered, and transformed into organic manure utilizing aero bins.
- Food waste from various sources including the canteen was turned into compost.
- Vermicomposting is being carried out on a regular basis in the college for past few years.
- Waste paper is recycled in the college recycling unit. As far as possible, used A4 papers are reused for rough work, assignments, notices, applications etc., empty cardboard cartons were reused as waste paper collection boxes.
- The institute had signed a contract with an agency 'Biotic Waste Solutions Pvt. Ltd' to collect and disposeoff bio-medical and bio-hazardous waste generated in college.
- The college also manages solid waste by giving it to the MCD.
- E-waste including discardable printers, phones and other electronic waste are regularly discarded and updated whenever possible.
- The college not only believes in recycling but also reducing the amount of waste being generated.
- All through the year, environmental awareness events in different forms like webinars, student marches, cleanliness drives etc. were organized to increase awareness among students.
